Mapping Your Career: Urban Planning, BSP

Planning is a highly collaborative field, and planners spend much of their time working with others. The planner's role is to provide the big picture and to relate the project to various goals and guidelines, such as ordinances or design review, in order to achieve a final project that meets the needs of the community. This might include appropriate design, environmental considerations, support for the local economy, or equitable access for all members of the community.¹

Industry Opportunities

- According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, within cities, urban planners will be needed to develop revitalization projects and address issues associated with population growth, environmental degradation, the movement of people and goods, and resource scarcity. Similarly, suburban areas and municipalities will need planners to address the challenges associated with population changes, including housing needs and transportation systems covering larger areas with less population density.
- Most planners perform their work in one or more particular fields of specialization within the larger planning profession. The American Planning Association has 23 divisions that cover planning specialty and interest areas such as Community Activism/Empowerment, Economic Development, Environmental & Natural Resources Planning, Historic Preservation, and many more.²
