URBAN PLANNING SCHOLARSHIPS AND AWARDS

The following provides an overview of some funding sources available through the School of Geographical Sciences and Urban Planning for urban planning students. Inquiries about these awards can be made to Jason.Kelley@asu.edu.

SGSUP Urban Planning Travel Scholarship

The School of Geographical Sciences and Urban Planning provides scholarships each year in support of student travel-related expenses for the following:

- Research related to a thesis or applied project
- Planning internship opportunity in another city or country
- Paper presentation at a national or international planning conference
- Participation in the Network for European and United States Regional and Urban Studies (NEURUS) program
- Other travel opportunities as determined worthy of support by committee

Scholarships are awarded on a competitive basis and are selected by the urban planning faculty members of the awards committee. Scholarships are awarded annually to those students who best demonstrate how the travel experience will enhance their academic success and career potential in the planning profession.

The following requirements must be met in order to be eligible for the Urban Planning Travel Scholarship:

- Full-time MUEP students in the first or second year
- Students must be in good standing, with a minimum GPA of 3.0

To apply for the Urban Planning Travel Scholarship:

- Students must complete the Urban Planning Scholarships and Awards application form available on the SGSUP website
 - Clearly mark on the application the award for which you are applying and complete the required information
 - Applications should be submitted to Jason.Kelley@asu.edu
 - Applications must be received by March 1st of each school year
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Gage Davis Associates Urban Planning International Travel Scholarship

Gage Davis generously established this scholarship to expand the educational experience of urban planning students through the opportunity to travel to countries outside the United States. The inspiration for this scholarship came from his experiences traveling, working and studying architecture, design and planning in some of the world's most well-known cities, prior to attending architecture school at the University of Colorado.

The endowment provides travel scholarships for students enrolled in the urban planning degree programs in the School of Geographical Sciences and Urban Planning, in accordance with the following criteria:

- Scholarships are to be used to provide funds for U.S. citizens or permanent residents to travel outside the United States.
- Recipients shall be full-time graduate students or undergraduate students at the junior or senior level.
- Students are expected to return to ASU for a minimum of one semester prior to graduation so they may share their travel experiences with other students and faculty.

- Students must complete the Urban Planning Scholarships and Awards application form available on the SGSUP website
- Clearly mark on the application the award for which you are applying and complete the required information
- Applications should be submitted to Jason.Kelley@asu.edu
- Applications must be received by March 1st of each school year

Mary R. Kihl Leadership Endowment and Leadership Award

One of the leading and most influential transportation planners in the US, Mary R. Kihl was a professor in Planning at ASU from 1996 until her death in 2007. The endowment established in her memory recognizes her dedication, leadership and contributions to ASU and the field of planning.

The Mary R. Kihl Leadership Endowment supports a bi-annual scholarship, the Mary R. Kihl Leadership Award, to a graduate student in planning who exemplifies leadership qualities within both the planning program and the community at large. In alternate years, the endowment funds are used to support lectures, symposia and other activities supporting scholastic development in the field of planning.

The following requirements must be met in order to be eligible for the Mary R. Kihl Leadership Award:

- Full-time MUEP students in the first or second year
